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1. Book Structure and Layout

Introduction

 - Clean brushes between color changes to maintain purity.
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Page Layout

 1. **Small Full-Color Image:** Located in the top-right corner for quick reference.
 2. **Grayscale Reproduction:** Faded to a very light brightness, covering most of the page, leaving ample space for painting.
 3. **Informative Paragraph:** Below the grayscale image, a brief description of:
 - The artist and their contribution to art.
 - The painting and its significance in the given style.
 - Key details about the color palette and technique.

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3. Book Size and Materials

About the Artist: Edgar Degas (1834–1917)

Edgar Degas was a masterful French Impressionist painter, known for his innovative depictions of modern life. Though often associated with Impressionism, Degas preferred to call himself a Realist, as he sought to capture fleeting moments of human activity with precision and grace. He was fascinated by movement and often painted dancers, musicians, and ordinary people in their daily routines. Degas' works are celebrated for their composition, light, and psychological depth.

About the Painting: *The Ballet Class*

The Ballet Class (circa 1874) captures a quiet yet dynamic scene of young dancers at practice under the watchful eye of their instructor. Degas frequently visited Parisian ballet studios, drawing inspiration from the disciplined artistry of the dancers. The muted color palette, dominated by soft whites, pastel blues, and warm earthy tones, conveys a serene atmosphere. Notice how Degas uses delicate brushwork to highlight the folds of the dresses, the textures of the floor, and the subtle play of light across the room.

Your Challenge

Recreate Degas' masterpiece by bringing life to the grayscale reproduction. Pay special attention to:

- The **soft pastel colors** of the dancers' attire.
- The warm, earthy hues of the wooden floor.
- The interplay of light and shadow in the studio.

Remember to keep your brushstrokes loose and natural to mimic Degas' style. Focus on capturing the mood and movement of the scene, rather than achieving perfect detail.

Fun Fact

Did you know that Degas often sketched dancers from life and then worked on his paintings in his studio? He combined careful observation with artistic imagination to create his iconic works.
