

Study: The Potential Perils of Overeducation

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Education is undeniably a cornerstone of society, driving advancements in science, technology, and overall human progress. It supports the continuous development of knowledge and enhances living standards worldwide.

However, there is an intriguing possibility that, at a certain point in societal progress, some segments of the population—particularly elites, ruling classes, government officials, and policy advisors—may become "overeducated."

In other words, as one increases, the other may decrease, resulting in an imbalance that leads to detrimental consequences. I will refer to this "overeducated and underbrained duality" as the "O&U Duality Law."

- **Foreign Policy:** Examine whether the Democratic Party's foreign policy positions (e.g., military interventions, diplomacy, climate change agreements) reflect a type of "overeducation" where experts believe they know the best course of action, but their strategies lead to unforeseen global instability, economic harm, or the empowerment of adversarial regimes.
- **Environmental Policy:** Investigate whether policies aiming to address climate change are grounded in idealistic, academic principles that ignore practical feasibility. For example, promoting policies like rapid transition away from fossil fuels without providing a viable alternative for jobs, energy production, or local economies might be an example of "underbrain" in action.

3. Gather Data

The proposals often fail to address the real-world economic consequences for communities and businesses, leading to possible alienation of key voter groups.
